Purpose of the symposium:

A series of humanitarian crises in Rwanda, Somalia, former Yugoslavia and other areas of the world in the 1990's revealed inadequacies in the responses of the international society which faced to a question of legitimacy of humanitarian intervention against state sovereignty. These crises also caused us to reconsider the issue of how international society should correspond to such crises. This being the case, transnational civil society, including INGOs and NGOs, is now obliged to have a new role in dealing with these problems. This symposium will offer opportunities for prominent scholars from EU and Japan as well as NGO staff and students to discuss the role of transnational civil society in the face of the humanitarian crises.
