FTA Policy of Japan: An Empirical Analysis of Large Scale Company Data

This presentation examines the use of free trade agreements (FTAs) by Japanese firms based on company level data with more than 1 million cases. This is the first attempt to use large scale data on the analysis of the use of the FTAs. The data set includes all trade transactions (export from Japan) using FTAs from April 2005 to April 2010. This analysis finds that the use of FTAs in Japan is heavily concentrated on a few big companies. Toyota Motor Corp. takes a lion's share of 30% and Nissan Motor Company follows, with the share of 12%. The cumulative share of top 10 companies reaches more than 70%. Small and medium companies (SMEs) do not use FTAs, in general, compared with big companies. For SMEs, there are some obstacles to using FTAs that include difficulty in obtaining the certificate of origin that is required to use the FTA. The lack of knowledge of FTAs, and the lack of human resources in the SMEs also make it difficult to take advantage of FTAs.



TAKAHASHI Katsuhide is graduated from the Department of Political Economy, Waseda University and started working as a reporter at the Nihon Keizai Shimbun (Nikkei) in 1982. He joined the Japan Center for Economic Research as an economist in 1987, and returned to Nikkei in 1993. He became Associate Professor of Economics at Kobe University in 2004 and assumed his post at Kokugakuin University in 2008. His areas of specialization include effects of free trade agreements on business cycles in the global economy.

He is currently focusing on large scale data on certification of rules of origin; and the economic development of greater Mekong region and japanese firms

Isabelle GIRAUDOU (Doctorate Paris II) is Researcher at Maison francojaponaise, Associate Researcher at Hokkaido University, and lecturer at Paul Cézanne University, Aix-Marseille III. She has taught French Public Law in several Japanese universities and her publications have addressed environmental rights, equality between men and women in the judiciary, and the question of the sources of law from a comparative perspective. Dealing with the expertise of Japan in the field of international cooperation, and focusing on translation as a new epistemological tool in comparative law, her research raises the question of a possible alternative approach to legal transplants.
