What Future for the Social Security System in Japan?

Summary

After "the crisis" of the welfare state followed by its shrinking, we have been on the transition to a formation of an alternative/new one, the so-called post-welfare state in various ways, depending on the country. How has Japan coped with this crisis of welfare state? In general, the welfare budget was cut and the "Independence Support" – Japanese version of workfare reform– was introduced in many areas. The outcomes of these reforms are the widening of income gaps and the increase of poverty and the anti-poverty campaign. Partly due to this, the DPJ managed to remove the LDP from power, which is a historical change on the Japanese political scene. In the seminar, will be discussed (1) How Japan coped with "the crisis of welfare state" and (2) What is the future for the social security system in Japan by drawing on two major social security policies of DPJ which are Child Allowance and Earned Income Tax Credit.

KATADA Kaori was graduated in Social Policy from Tokyo Metropolitan University. She was part-time lecturer at Tokyo Gakugei University and Obirin University, before being appointed Assistant Professor in the Department of Social Welfare and Social Policy of Saitama Prefectural University. Network and a member of the executive board of Hot-Pot, a NPO dealing with poverty. Her research areas include politics of poverty, women and poverty, social policy and basic income.
